Federation's 2023 Annual Conference Decision "On Peace" states:

"Federation reaffirms our commitment to campaigning for Australia to become a signatory to the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, and will continue to support the work of International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, Australia (ICAN)."

Today on Hiroshima Day, ICAN has released the results of a new national poll revealing that two-thirds of Australians want the government to sign and ratify the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW): [New Poll: Two-thirds of Australians want to sign the nuclear weapon ban - ICAN Australia](#)

Gem Romuld, ICAN Australia Director, said:

"Eighty years after Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Australians are crystal clear — our country must take action to ensure these weapons are never used again. The Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons is the global pathway forward. Australians expect our government to deliver on Labor's longstanding promise to sign and ratify the treaty, and to do so in this term of Parliament."
